it takes patient work by hand to restore them.


While there is no need to scan all rare books in our collections, we would like to scan early books with unique features such as extraillustrations and annotations.


It is important that the scanning be done without inflicting damage to these special volumes.

#2 – WSU owns **oversized maps and posters** that can't be digitized on our smaller scanners.





There are many maps in WSU's collection, including historical, cultural, topographic, and nautical maps (like this one), as well as...

...some hand-drawn and colored maps,

complete with map-maker's notes.



Many useful and historical maps are almost inaccessible until they can be digitized.



Here are some of the unusual posters that could be shared if digitized.










#3 – Most urgently, original blueprints of WSU buildings have been located.

Many of these blueprints have mold and are deteriorating.



They need to be digitized with a largescale scanner in order to preserve them and their valuable information.



The possibilities for preserving and creating unique digital collections from WSU's holdings are limited by the need for one key piece of equipment: the **Zeutschel Omniscan** 14000 AO scanner, which costs \$125,000.
